Letter from the President

The beauty of the Northwoods during these winter months is breathtaking. While there is a peaceful serenity during this time of the year, much is going on. People are enjoying snowmobiling, ice fishing, cross country skiing, snowshoeing and many events hosted by surrounding communities. The summer crowd may be gone but the winter crowd is here enjoying the countless opportunities the season presents.

The summer, seemingly far away is actually not that far off and much needs to be done in anticipation of its arrival. The Board's primary focus at the moment is in the realm of Aquatic Invasive Species. This is the time of year we develop strategies for prevention, education and AIS management for the coming summer. To bring you up to speed on a few things, last October I attended the Upper Midwest Invasive Species Conference in Duluth, MN. I attended over 35 workshops and presentations during the three day event. The reality of invasive species and potential havoc they can wage is sobering. However, the advancement of technologies, techniques and trends in combating invaders is encouraging. The conference is not only a venue for education, but it provides an important opportunity to network, build relationships and learn about trends and innovation elsewhere across the Upper Midwest and beyond.

On the last day of the conference, the State of Michigan announced the availability of a first time new AIS grant opportunity. This was exciting news for organizations in Michigan combating both terrestrial and aquatic invaders. A quick overview of the program revealed a narrow timeline in which to apply and limited funds for which there would be substantial competition. Our best hope for tapping into the grant money was as part of a partnership of regional organizations. Ultimately, a grant proposal was developed in which the CCROA joined in a cooperative and collaborative effort with ISCCW and



numerous other organizations and partners in Gogebic and Iron Counties including the United States Forest Service. The grant application has been completed and submitted. We are cautiously optimistic on the outcome. Candidly, the success of securing the grant is diminished due to the limited funds available and the intense competition from interested applicants from across the entire state. In spite of the uphill battle, we were obligated to vigorously pursue the grant even more so in view of the noise I have made to elected officials in the form of passionate appeals for the state to provide greater support to our efforts on the Cisco Chain. Keep your fingers crossed for a happy outcome.

Responding to another opportunity, I have been working with our biologist Barb to draft a grant request for continued help from the Bond Falls Implementation Team (BFIT). We are integrating an exciting water monitoring component in the request. We are hopeful to initiate more comprehensive water quality studies this year which will require some volunteer involvement. The commitment is minimal and involves taking secchi disk readings (see page 2), to document water clarity, once a week or every other week and taking water samples two or three times a year. If you would like to volunteer to assist with the project on your lake, please contact me! This is an extremely worthwhile and beneficial program.

On the topic of the dam purchase, I am frustrated to inform you once again that there is absolutely nothing to report. The final decision lies in the hands of FERC (Federal Energy Regulatory Commission).

PRESIDENTS REPORT (continued)

The final drafts of the CCROA Bylaws and Articles of Incorporation as well as Principles of Investment documents presented at the 2014 annual CCROA membership meeting have temporarily stalled due to health issues our attorney is addressing. At this point, there is not a projected timeline for completion of the documents and presentation of them to the membership.

Hopefully, the next newsletter will provide good news on all of the fore mentioned subjects. If you haven't already done so, please renew your membership for 2015. Your financial support in the form of dues and contributions toward our Lake Management and Walleye Stocking funds are critical to ongoing efforts to maintain and sustain the Cisco Chain of Lakes. Also, your voice as a member is important. Member's concerns and ideas have been a driving force behind numerous initiatives. Do not under estimate the importance of being a member of the CCROA. We encourage you to be an ambassador of the CCROA and champion the organization's good work by reminding neighbors to join or renew their membership.

Secchi Disk Water Quality Monitoring

The secchi disk is a simple but effective tool that measures water clarity. Good water quality is important for fish and aquatic plants.

A secchi disk is an 8 inch diameter, black and white disk. It is attached to a dowel rod, rope or chain. The rod, rope or chain is marked in inch or centimeter intervals using permanent ink, paint or clamps. The length of the rod, rope or chain depends on how clear the water is requiring the disk to be lowered deeper than if the water was somewhat murky.

Weekly or bi-weekly readings are done in the same location each time. Date of the reading is recorded, the depth at which the disk disappears and after lowering the disk more & the raising it, the depth at which the disk reappears. The secchi disk measurement is the average of the two measurements.

Battling the Barberry CCROA Collaboration

On July 23rd through July 25th, 2014, Lac Vieux Desert Youth Corps, along with their Crew Leader, sprayed and hand pulled Japanese Barberry on several properties on the west shore of 1000 Island Lake and on Long Lake, in an effort to control this terrestrial invasive species.

The participating youth enjoyed the opportunity to learn. The use of chemical treatment on the LVD properties is prohibited and only allowed by permit. It was a learning experience for them as an alternate method of control of an invasive species. In doing so, they felt their efforts had a major impact in the control of Japanese Barberry.

Many thanks go out to the LVD Youth Corps and Crew Leaders for all their hard work. Hand pulling barberry is not an easy endeavor. Thanks also to the Lac Vieux Desert Band of Lake Superior Chippewa Indians for this innovative youth program.


Measurements are most accurate when done on relatively calm, sunny days during the middle of the day.

Turbidity is produced by sediment (brownish muddy color), phytoplankton (greenish color) or humic stain (tea color from decaying leaves or plants). Very often it is a combination of 2 or 3 of these sources.

In addition to collecting very important data about your lake, it is simple and fun to do. It is a great family or neighborhood project. The data is then sent to the State where detailed lake readings are maintained.

Here's a dandy that was caught winter, 2014 on 1000 Island Lake. Ice fishing can be rewarding and sometimes just cold.

Even though it is winter we all need to remember Aquatic Invasive Species involves more than just plants. All bait should be disposed of properly, NOT thrown into the lake or left on the ice. That includes worms, grubs and especially minnows. Dress warmly and enjoy a day on the ice.

Road Work and Closures On The Chain

Thousand Island Lake Road repairs will resume this summer. A series of culverts will be replaced starting at US 2 and heading south. There are about 8 to 10 culverts that will be replaced. Fortunately these replacements are not as deep or extensive culverts as last summer's culvert replacements. There will be road closures on Thousand Island Lake Road, but not to the extent of last summer's closures. Work is not anticipated to begin until after July 4, 2015.

All of this is preparation for a paving project for summer 2016/2017. The upcoming culvert replacement and subsequent paving project are all part of a 3 year Federal funding program.

Lindsley Bridge rehabilitation begins this year. As soon as Gogebic County received MDOT final review, the Lindsley Bridge along with 3 other bridge projects in Gogebic County will be sent out for bids. Final review from MDOT is not expected until April. At this time, the County does not have a projected start date for the bridge work but it will be sometime this summer.

The bridge will be done on a $\frac{1}{2}$ width project with only 1 lane closed at a time.

It is estimated that the Thousand Island Lake Road project and the Lindsley Bridge rehabilitation project will cost over \$400,000.00.

Yes, road construction is inconvenient; however, it is sorely needed and the end result is gratefully appreciated. Plan accordingly and be patient. Please extend courtesy to the construction workers. They are out there in heat, cold, wind and worst of all the **BUGS**.

Gogebic County Road Commission will keep the CCROA updated on road work plans or changes. We'll keep the membership advised.



Winter Wonders

Have you ever walked or gone snowshoeing or skiing through the woods and observed tiny black specks (like grains of pepper) on the snow that seem to move and jump? You are seeing "Snow Fleas". They are **not** fleas, they are springtails. They don't bite; they prefer bits of rotting vegetation. These tiny insects are here year round and on warm, sunny winter days they work their way up through the snow to feast on debris on top of the snow. Why do they jump? It might be to avoid predation; however, I like to think they are so happy the sun is shining that they are jumping with joy.

When you're out in the woods in the winter, take the time to observe the amazing evidence of life around you. Deer, wolf, and coyote tracks are of course evident; but take the time to look closely and see the little creatures' tracks, too.
